
Hi Everyone!





It is dark in the middle of the day and there was a sunset extending 360 degrees around us. Once the sun started peeking out, on went the eclipse glasses and sun filters. In another hour it was over. March 30th was the date. The destination - Kitt Peak National Observatory. Tour Leader Kurt Fuerstenau assembled the group on West Ajo Way. 25 Porsches and 34 PCA-SAR Club members were right on time for the driver's meeting and a 9:30 departure. A 36-mile drive west brought us to the 12 miles of twisty, Porsche road up to the 7000 ft elevation observatory site on top of Kitt Peak.



We were met there by our energetic, seasoned, personal tour guide, Docent Noel. He gave us a very thorough description of the background of the site and the importance of the U of A to the development and continuing staffing of the observatory projects. Founded in 1958, there are 17 separate observatories on the Peak, and it is one of the largest arrays of optical and radio telescopes in the world! We focused mainly on the Mayall telescope which is the largest on the Peak. Noel gave a presentation that covered all the activities and history. Inserted in the presentation there was a surprise video of PCA-SAR Porsche material that included a "redline revving" Porsche racing tach that got a big cheer from the members!

We were able to enjoy the displays at the visitor's center and look through a Solar Telescope to see solar flares, and sunspots on our sun. Then we took off on a 1/2-mile walk (van transport also provided) to the Mayall Telescope. The huge 4-meter glass mirror was built at the University



of Arizona in their special mirror laboratory as part of their astronomy program and weighs 15 tons. The innerworkings that allow the telescope to have full views of any part of space is HUGE! This telescope is officially part of the NOIRLab program, linked by a supercomputer to the Cerro Tolo site in Chile. It has currently been modified with a very complicated computerized primary mirror to examine deep space as part of the DESI program. That is a Dark Energy Spectroscopic Instrument that is mapping galaxies to explore the nature of dark energy.

Following our tour, we retired to various sheltered locations to enjoy our picnic lunches. The sheltering was necessary since, in spite of it being a beautiful day, the wind had really come up and gusts of 40 mph were reported. Many members ended up chasing hats! Our hats were off anyway to Kurt and Andrea Fuerstenau for a well-organized and most interesting tour. If you were not able to attend, you should go on your own. It's close, it's world-class, and it has a great Porsche road! Google it for details.

A Successful Spring 2024 PCA-SAR Adopt-A-Roadway Event By Lon Reeder – Community Service Chair

Saturday March 23rd, 2024, was our club's opportunity to perform its semi-annual Adopt-a-Roadway community service. Our responsibility is the cleanup of the section of Orange Grove Road between Oracle Road and 1st Avenue. Our last cleanup was in October 2023, so I drove that stretch of Orange Grove a couple days prior to check its condition. 




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Project Corner

Kitt Peak Tour

Folklore has it that Easter time is always windy. The Southern Arizona Region Porsche Club believes that it is true. On March 30th 2024, the Club took a drive to visit Kitt Peak National Observatory.

Quoting Wikipedia, "The Kitt Peak National Observatory is a United States astronomical observatory located on Kitt Peak in the Quinlan Mountains in the Arizona-Sonoran Desert on the Tohono O'odham Nation, 55 miles west- southwest of Tucson, Arizona. With more than twenty optical and two radio telescopes, it is one of the largest gatherings of optical instruments in Earth's northern hemisphere."

Trip leader Kurt Fuerstenau gathered the group of 24 Porsches, with 34 people, at the Burger King on Ajo Way just past the Freeway. "This is a simple drive. Turn right on Ajo, go 36.1

miles, turn left on the Kitt Peak Road for 12 miles and you will be at the Kitt Peak Visitors Center."

We headed west in two groups. The traffic was light. The drive was enjoyable, except that from the start the wind was a bit of a problem. It wasn't too bad as we went up the twisty road on the leeward side of the mountain. It was a different story when we reached the Visitor Center on the top at 6866 feet.

When we stepped out of our cars, it was a chilling 45 degrees with 50 mile an hour gusts of wind. While some were chasing their hats down the

street, others were adding layers of clothing. I felt comfortable with my stocking cap, a T-shirt, heavy shirt, down vest and a warm coat.

There were several things of interest around the Visitor Center Plaza, A 10



inch crystal sphere sun dial showed the correct time. A small open top structure housed a Docent with two solar telescopes where you could see sunspots and a large solar flare.



Once we were inside the sanctuary of the Visitors Center, we were guided by Docent Noel Paraninfo, a retired Radiologist, who was fount of knowledge. After explaining the function of the various telescopes and spectrometry analysis, he described black holes. Then he told us how Kitt Peak is a leader in deciphering the mysterious dark energy that is causing the universe to expand faster.



The highlight of the tour was going up the hill to the Mayall telescope. When it was built in 1973 it was the second largest telescope in the in the world. It

has a four meter wide reflecting mirror that was cast in the Mirror Lab under the east side of the U of A football stadium. It was named after Nicholas Mayall when he retired as Director of Kitt Peak National Observatory in 1973.



There is an enclosed walkway that circles the dome to give a 365-degree view of the area. Then our group climbed up stars to view the entire telescope. Our Docent gave a detailed description of how the



telescope is mounted on a huge gimble with the large Dark Energy Spectroscopic Instrument (DESI) attached to the front.

There were some of our group who braved the gusty conditions to have a picnic at the picnic tables, while others ate in their cars. Karma and I found that the Macan's interior was a nice place for lunch.

A bonus for the drive was the wild flower display at the bottom, near the Ajo highway. For about a mile, a swath of purple flowers surrounded the bases of the mesquite trees.

• New rates are \$56.00 for one year, \$110.00 for 2 years and \$162 for 3 years.


