## **Speed Bump** - Slow Down For Some Automotive Tales

### Karma

My partner, Karma Kientzler, 82, recently passed away from a traumatic brain injury. She was a multi-talented person who enjoyed the diversity of the members of the Southern Arizona Region of the Porsche Club of America. I would like to share some of her life and automotive interests.

She grew up in Tooele, Utah, (too-wil-a) a crossroads town, a few miles west of Salt Lake City. Her Mormon parents were Jack and Elva Clarke. Her two sisters were Collen and Mignon, 11 and 16 years older.

Jack had property on the edge of town where he had farm buildings and ran the local tow truck and storage lot. Karma learned to drive at an early age. Sometimes Jack would call her to bring the wrecker out to the crash site. He always had a car for her to drive. He'd often change out her cars saying "OK, I just sold your car so here is another one."

Her father was a true *Jack of all trades*. He was Tooele's Police Commissioner and drove the school bus every day. Karma discovered her artistic talents when she helped her mother in her flower shop.

She played the piano and also learned how to play the great Salt Lake Tabernacle organ. It has been described as one of the most perfect organs ever built.

Karma decided she wanted to learn to swim, so at age 8 she signed up for lessons without her parent's knowledge. Not only did she pass the rigorous certification, she went on to become a competitive swimmer, synchronized swimmer, and eventually, the coach of the Bountiful City Swim Team.

Karma would drive her classmates to Utah State
University in Provo, where she was active in the Tri
Delta Sorority. She majored in Art and minored in
Physical Education. Following college, she married Allen
Kientzler, a carrier based Naval aviator who also
attended Utah State.



She loved the 2023 Parade in Palm Springs where the photo of her and the White 2015 Macan S won third place in the national photo contest.

When the Navy Fleet was in the Mediterranean, Karma and another naval wife toured Europe, frequently driving from country to country. Soon she had two children, Alesha and Christofer.

Things were rough after Allen returned from being shot down in Vietnam and spending time in the Hanoi Hilton prison. It wasn't long before they were divorced and Karma was on her own raising her two children.

By the mid-1970s Karma had partnered with Shiela Cluff to design and operate the prestigious Oaks Spa in Ojai, California. She and Shiela were visionaries in the health and wellness industry. 1978, Mel Zuckerman, a home builder from Tucson who was overweight and struggling with asthma, checked in as a guest at the Oaks. Soon Karma had him losing weight, gaining strength, and jogging. In 1979 Mel bought the Double U Guest Ranch on Tucson's east side and decided to open his own heathy living center. He named it Canyon Ranch. He brought Karma to Tucson to become the Founding Fitness Director with the responsibility of designing all fitness activities, as well as hiring and training the entire fitness staff.

At various times Karma the athlete was a very good skier, frequent scuba diver, and an avid bicyclist. She didn't like horseback riding or sleeping in a tent.

During her many years at Canyon Ranch Karma drove a 1995 Nisson 240 SX SE sports car until parts became scarce. It is said that she had been stopped more than once for speeding on the old twisty, hilly, east side River Road.

Once Karma and I became partners five years ago she became a Porsche enthusiast. Karma made many friends in the Southern Arizona Region of the Porsche Club. We did three Concours with my '87 Targa. We did many of the week-end drives and over-night trips in other Porsche models.

Karma's friend Jim Click made sure that her everyday drive was a well-maintained Mazda 3. However, Karma's true love was her pickup truck.

For almost 20 years, Karma has puttered around in a classic Nissan Frontier Pickup. She used it for some hauling but mostly for pleasure. I think it must have reminded her of the days with her father, Jack, and the wrecker service.

So, I wrap up this tale about Karma Kientzler. She was a perky redhead that was full of life and enjoyed her automobiles. There is a hole in my heart and I know many friends from across many years will miss her greatly.



# **Project Corner**

## **Practice Makes Perfect/Learning from Mistakes**

#### There's the little lessons...

After finally getting Thumbelina - our 944 S2 race car - running, my first response was to start registering for events. Of course, this rush of enthusiasm fueled by actually having a running race car was probably a bit overly optimistic. Once I started going over the work and preparation that was still needed, I started to see a few issues that could stand a little more attention.

In some instances, these were minor upgrades, like adding power for the required onboard cameras. In other cases, things might be a bit more complicated, like the expiration date on my seat having passed while Thumbelina was down for engine repairs.

Luckily, most of these issues have a reasonable resolution or work around. The cameras could continue using batteries for power. The seat having an expired date is a bit more complicated, but there are still options. Fortunately, I have a back brace installed to support the seat, which keeps the existing seat in compliance.

While I had time between all the trouble shooting and repairs I should have been checking things like dates on the safety gear. The lesson here is that I have some improvements to make in developing a system to track the work needing to be done.

#### And then, there are the bigger lessons...

Once the engine not running problem was solved, there were still signs that everything wasn't as it should be. Careful inspection, followed up with some additional testing, lead to the diagnosis of a failed head gasket.

The first indication that there was still a problem was the extra difficulty starting the engine. While some extra cranking would be expected with the fuel system having been dry with so many new or changed parts, it happened with the second starting, too.

What really triggered the extra look and testing was the amount of smoke. Upon first start, a lot of smoke was coming from the headers and exhaust, which had all been touched by my well-oiled hands. However, after initial burn off, there was still white smoke coming from the tailpipe, along with extra dampness.

After performing a cooling system pressure test, followed by a leak down test of the cylinders, I confirmed that the head gasket was in need of replacement. Fortunately, having just finished installing the head, the job was not particularly daunting.

#### Practice makes perfect

A recurring theme with Thumbelina has been the challenge of obtaining parts for a reasonable price and in a timely fashion. The head gasket remained true to this form, and getting the gasket actually took longer than swapping it.

Once the swap was done, start-up went easier and the smoke from the exhaust cleared up very nicely.

Having learned the lesson that it's

best to check results of the repairs more carefully, I found signs that there was still an intermix problem - oil was getting into the water, and water into the oil.

Additionally, there was far more oil than reasonable under the engine. Some of the oil was determined to be power steering fluid, but there was also oil coming from the front main seal/oil pump area. Luckily, this was easy to pinpoint as I have deleted the covers from the timing belt, making the front of the engine much easier to see.

Parts were ordered immediately, and the oil pump gear and main seals will soon be replaced to address the oil leak. Further repairs will include resealing the oil cooler to address the intermix problem.

The power steering pump and reservoir will also be removed, hopefully clearing up a phantom oil leak that predates my ownership of Thumbelina.

#### Practice, practice, practice

Once these repairs are complete and correct, I will have changed two head gaskets, installed the head twice, set the camshaft timing twice, changed out the starter, changed the fuel pump, and changed and tensioned the timing belt three times.

On the positive side, most of these repairs should prove preventative for the coming race season. And, in a pinch, I now have the knowledge to make several of these repairs in the pits at a long race event.

Mechanically speaking, I know the way to Carnegie Hall.

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
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
